


CUSHING AWARDED METAL OF HONOR



Because the efforts of Kent Masterson Brown, well know Civil War author and Senator Russ Feingold of Wisconsin, Alonzo Cushing has been awarded the medal of honor. He is the first Civil War soldier to be Honored posthumously. Alonzo is buried at West Point from where he graduated in 1861. He was 22 years old when he was killed at Gettysburg while he single handed his artillery piece.
