150 YEARS AGO

December 2 - The first Union prisoners arrive at Salisbury Prison in North Carolina.

December 4 - John Breckinridge of Kentucky, former vice president and presidental candidate, is expelled from the U.S. Senate after having joined the Confederate Army.

December 9, 10 - Congress creates the joint Congressional Committee on the Conduct of the War to investigate the war effort, especially the debacle at Ball's Bluff.

December 20 - Fighting at Dranesville, Virginia results in the first Union land victory east of the Alleghenies.

December 27 - the U.S. government agrees to release Mason and Slidell and issues an unapologetic statement to the British government.
